Next Steps for the Garnet Mesa Solar Project

Many of you may be wondering what's next for the Garnet Mesa Solar Array project. In March, the Delta County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) voted against permitting this energy project, citing agricultural and irrigation concerns. Today, I have an update.

DMEA, Guzman Energy, and the project developer, Citra, have been working to improve the application, addressing the community's and commissioners' concerns. Together, we hosted a community open house late last month to answer member questions and listen to feedback. In addition to our open house, we met with neighboring landowners to better understand their concerns and answer questions, explicitly addressing the agricultural and irrigation questions raised at the last permitting review.

We are confident that the Garnet Mesa Solar Array is ready for a second review with the Delta County BOCC. This additional permitting review will come at the August session on Tuesday, August 16, at 10:00 a.m.

The goal of local energy projects, like the Garnet Mesa Solar Array, is to improve service to members. Local energy projects boost our grid's resiliency and help us continue stabilizing your rates by providing affordable energy. We are confident that Garnet Mesa Solar can bridge Delta's rich agricultural heritage with a new energy future.

While today's message may not have included the finality that many of you wanted, it is a giant step in the right direction. We cannot sufficiently express our gratitude for the outpouring of community support for our efforts to create a local, renewable source of power in DMEA's service territory. Lastly, we would be remiss not to thank the Delta BOCC for reconsidering our application at next month's session.

BENEFITS OF SOLAR POWER



AFFORDABILITY

DMEA will purchase a portion of the energy produced by Garnet Mesa Solar at a competitive price point, helping us to continue stabilizing our members' rates.



LONG-LASTING

The typical lifespan of solar electric facilities is 30 years, and over that time, solar plants require much less maintenance than traditional fossil-fueled plants.



ABUNDANT SUPPLY

With an average of 300 sunny days a year in Colorado, solar panels have ample time to capture the sun's rays and transform them into electricity. They do this without gas emissions.



MULTI-USE LAND

The Garnet Mesa Solar Array has been designed for energy and agricultural production. The land will continue to be irrigated and grazed, most likely by domestic sheep.

BIG INTERNET FOR SMALL BUDGETS

LIFELINE & ACP INTERNET BILL ASSISTANCE



Two government assistance programs are available that provide discounted internet service for eligible low-income households.

Elevate Internet participates in the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) and Lifeline, which provide discounts on internet service to qualifying consumers. Created to ensure all families have access to high-speed internet regardless of income, these programs can help reduce your internet bill by as much as \$39.25 per month. Consumers must meet income-based requirements or already participate in Medicaid, SNAP, SSI, Federal Public House Assistance, or Veterans Pension and Survivors Act.

STEP 1 SELECT AUTO PAY


Log in to your online SmartHub account. Under billing and payments, select the 'Auto Pay Program' option.


STEP 2 CHOOSE HOW TO PAY


Under the Actions section, click 'Sign Up For Auto Pay' and choose either a new card, a bank account, or an existing card.

FIRE PREVENTION ELECTRIC GRID SAFETY

DMEA on Fire Prevention Mode

With the continued high temperatures and dry, windy weather, DMEA has put in effect its fire prevention procedures. This special mode of operations greatly reduces the risk of a fire being started by electrical equipment but does come with ramifications: **DMEA** members may find that power outages last longer than under normal conditions.

It's especially important to report any issues or damage to DMEA immediately.

DMEA asks members who experience an outage or observe anything that seems out of the ordinary concerning power lines or power equipment to:

- 1 Stay clear of the area in question
- 2 Call DMEA at 877-687-3632 to report the situation.

DMEA will return to normal operating procedures when the fire danger rating decreases to a safe level. Please report all outages and do not rely on others to call in. Email and social media are not reliable for reporting outages, as they are not continuously monitored.
