Beyond Boundaries: DMEA Lineworker Helps Electrify Guatemala

In December 2023, DMEA had the privilege of participating in NRECA International, a volunteer initiative that works to improve the quality of life around the world by providing millions of people with access to safe, reliable, and affordable electricity. Larry Donathan, DMEA Equipment Technician Foreman, spent 12 days working in the rural mountainous villages of Guatemala, helping bring electricity and light to almost 200 different homes and families. On December 3, 2023, I flew to Guatemala City, beginning a twelve-day journey I'll never forget. So how did I get here? Rewind to last summer when my supervisor asked if I would like to volunteer with the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) International and help wire homes in Guatemala. I was sold.

After arriving in Guatemala, I met the nine-member team from Arkansas that I would be working with. We rented pickup trucks and began our first five-hour drive to our stopover for the night. Here, we met the rest of our team from Oklahoma.

We made yet another five-hour journey the next day, reaching the town of Fray Bartolome De Las Casas in the Northern mountainous area of Guatemala. This would be our basecamp for the remainder of the trip.


The following day, it was time to get to work.

We loaded the trucks with enough materials to wire ten houses and set out for a two-hour drive to one of the small villages.

> At each home, we worked with the families, thanks to interpreters, to determine the location of the electrical panel, four light bulbs, two light switches, and two outlets.

It was incredible to see and experience a different way of life from back home. The men carried material, dug the holes for the power posts, and ran wire with us. Everyone in the village was happy and smiling the entire time. What a great group of people.

Between all crews on the trip, we brought electricity to 197 homes, but interacting with the villagers was the best part of my trip. I had a wonderful time on this trip and would go back and do it again if given the chance. I have great memories of the people I met, the work I did, and the experiences I had.

While Herod provides direction as needed, the NHS students are responsible for all aspects of the event, from planning to implementation, including budgeting, decorations, refreshments, and music. The event is held off school grounds, making it that much more special for the students.

"I found the dance to be a surprising highlight of my year. It was one of the most memorable projects I've worked on in high school, and I hope that it continues to happen year after year," said Rhyan Neary, Montrose High NHS student.


HOW DO I RUN FOR THE BOARD?

Beware of Winter POWER POLE COLLISIONS

You've just been in an accident involving a downed power line. Your first instinct might be to get out and run, but that could cost you your life.

In most cases, the safest place to be is inside your car or truck, which acts as an insulator and keeps you out of the path of stray electricity. Call 9-1-1, and tell the dispatcher a downed line or other electrical equipment is involved. DMEA lineworkers will be dispatched to the scene to de-energize the power.

There is no way to tell if a downed line is energized by looking. Always assume a downed line (or any line) is live, even if it is not buzzing or sparking. Wait to exit the car until you receive the all clear from utility or emergency personnel.

If your car is on fire or you see smoke, escape as safely as possible by making a clean, solid jump out with feet together and hop away with both feet together as far as you can. Warn others not to approach the scene.

Did you know?

Not only are auto accidents involving DMEA power poles potentially dangerous for drivers and passengers, they often cause extended outages and costly repairs. Drive safe out there!
