### Regular Maintenance is the Key to Reliability

DMEA has a legacy of providing reliable power to our members, but that doesn't happen by chance. It requires concentrated regular maintenance, and this month, I'm highlighting two of DMEA's most recent grid reliability efforts. One on foot, the other in the air.

Every year, DMEA partners with the experienced industry expert, SBS Inspections Inc., to quality test a portion of our power poles. In September, this boots-on-the-ground team began working in some of our most rural terrain, primarily the Cimarron area. The contractors are visually inspecting each pole, looking for obvious damage, but they are also testing

for unseen indicators.

To test for internal decay, contractors bore a small sample from the pole and inspect it for rot or moisture. They will also dig down up to 18" around the base of the pole and look for signs of external decay. In total, SBS will visit and test more than 3,500 DMEA power poles, and we expect the work to continue into the winter – but don't worry, as the weather turns, they'll move out of our mountain terrain into lower elevations.

Another critical aspect of DMEA's system reliability program is aerial line patrol. Last month, two DMEA lineworkers took flight with the local helicopter service, Mountain Blade Runner, to inspect our grid from above. This one-day task requires intense focus as the lineworkers visually inspect more than 160 miles of line, along with pole structures, equipment, and substations. They look for damage, wear and tear, and overgrown vegetation. The flight path takes them to every corner of our

service territory, again to some of our most rural places that aren't accessed regularly.


These are just two of our many system reliability programs, but regardless of what we're doing, the goal is the same - to keep your lights on, homes warm, and families connected.







# Reopening the Paonia River Park

The Paonia River Park and K-8 School Loop Trails are the culmination of a multi-decade community vision, successful collaboration between non-profit and municipal stakeholders, and significant community investment. The park and walking trails are alive with activity from boaters, dog walkers, and kids learning about riparian ecology. Foxes, deer, and eagles can often be spotted in the park from dawn to dusk.

This spring, flooding damaged more than 1,000 feet of river bank and washed away trails in several areas. Parts of the park were underwater for weeks and needed to be rebuilt to make the park accessible.

## How We Helped

In conjunction with multiple partners, including The Nature Connection, Colorado Parks and Wildlife, community businesses, residents, and volunteer donations, DMEA contributed \$25,000 from its unclaimed capital credits fund to help reconstruct more than 1,000 feet of trails.
