

Public Safety Commission Meeting

August 25, 2016, 9:00 a.m. 6100 Guadalupe, Building E Austin, TX 78752

Summary

(This report represents a summary of events of the meeting, and is not a complete nor an exact transcript of testimony.)

The Public Safety Commission convened as posted to consider and take formal action, if necessary, on the following agenda items:

I. CALL TO ORDER

9:00 am – Chairwoman Cynthia Leon called the meeting to order. In attendance: Chairwoman Cindy Leon, Faith Johnson, Steven Mach, Randy Watson and Manny Flores. A quorum was present. Also present were, Director Steve McCraw, Deputy Director David Baker, Deputy Director Robert "Duke" Bodisch, and General Counsel Phil Adkins.



II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A motion was made by Commissioner Mach and seconded by Commissioner Johnson to approve the minutes from the June 16, 2016 PSC Meeting. Motion carried.

III. PUBLIC COMMENT

(Members of the public wishing to address the Commission are subject to a time limit of 5 minutes and must complete a Public Comment Registration Card located at the entry. Should a member of the public bring an item to the Commission for which the subject was not posted on the agenda of the meeting, state law provides that the Commission may receive the

information but cannot act upon it at the meeting. The Commission may direct staff to contact the requestor or request that the issue be placed on a future agenda for discussion.)

Chair Cindy Leon stated that there was multiple requests to address the Commission. There were two groups that asked to speak.

Duncan Fox introduced Bob Albertson and B.C. Lyons representing the DPS Museum. Mr. Fox discussed the DPS Museum's participation in the Museum Day celebration on September 18, 2016. He explained that is a great opportunity to show the public great memorabilia from DPS's proud history. Mr. Albertson explained that the Museum began in 1992, and the original idea was to build a new building on a large lot, but the funding did not materialize quickly. We are proud of the small museum that is housed in the lobby area of Building B. They explained that they are expecting approximately 2,000 visitors on that Saturday.

Aaron Shephard, refrigerated trucking company, and John ____? - Concerns with some of the aspects of the new CDL test. We are OK with the longer test. We are here to support a longer amount of time to complete the longer test. We have worked with AD Peters and applaud his work in this area. We are also working to allow a 3rd party to administer the testing.

Rob Hurt – American Commercial Vehicle Training Association - Here to address the 3rd party CDL testing. We applied DPS efforts to make the Texas roads safer. We too, support 3rd party testing.

IV. DIRECTORS REPORT

A. Presentations

Director Steve McCraw – Made the following presentations for Service Awards: (DPSOA thanks the DPS Media and Communications Office for the following report regarding the Awards.)

DPS Honors Exceptional Employees, Texans

AUSTIN – The Texas Public Safety Commission (PSC) and Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Director Steven McCraw presented two *Director's Citations*, two *Director's Awards* and one *Lifesaving Award* to employees, as well as two civilians for their exemplary actions and service.

"DPS and the entire state of Texas are grateful to have so many true public servants who dedicate their time and careers to helping others, and today we are pleased to recognize just a few of those outstanding individuals," said Director McCraw. "Thank you for your commitment to service and your vigilant efforts to protect your fellow Texans and to help fight crime in your communities."

The following awards were presented today:





- Criminal Investigations Division Special Agent Ben Allison and Special Agent Chris Barker, both CID in Texarkana, each received a *Director's Citation*. On Sept. 2, 2014, Allison and Barker were traveling on I-30 near Texarkana when they arrived at the scene of a major traffic collision, involving a semi-truck, its trailer and a work truck that were engulfed in flames. The DPS agents approached the work truck, which contained two trapped occupants, and began attempts to extinguish the flames. Three civilians were also at the scene using fire extinguishers in an effort to put out the flames. Despite all efforts, the fire eventually engulfed the entire truck, forcing rescuers to retreat. The two men inside the truck did not survive.
- Vickie Fowler and Roxanna Ortiz, employees of Municipal Services Bureau (MSB), each received a Director's Award for their part in a fraud investigation. MSB is the contracted vendor



for the state's Driver Responsibility Program, which features an indigent program that at the time reduced surcharges owed by individuals who have incomes at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty level. While working at MSB, Ortiz and Fowler alerted DPS to possible fraud after identifying applications submitted on behalf of customers who should not have qualified for the DPS Indigency Program. During the subsequent DPS investigation, it was determined department that the had lost approximately \$50,000 in legitimate surcharge fees, and the suspect was arrested and convicted of fraud.

Trooper Casey Dawson, Texas Highway Patrol in Borger, received a *Lifesaving Award*. On May 27, 2016, Trooper Dawson and Trooper Ben Dollar were dispatched to I-40 to locate a worker who was experiencing a medical emergency. When the troopers arrived at the scene, they observed that the male worker was having difficulty talking and he eventually experienced a seizure. Dawson, who has EMT experience, worked to assess the man's trauma level and provided first aid throughout the incident. Ultimately, Dawson performed CPS to help stabilize the man's condition and re-establish a pulse. He then



continued to monitor the man's vital signs until EMS arrived.



In addition to the awards above, the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators presented the department with the Public Affairs and Consumer Education Award, (PACE) which

spotlights agencies that have

committed their time and resources to outstanding consumer education programs. The DPS Driver License



Division received the *PACE Award* as recognition for its internal electronic publication *License to Drive* magazine. The magazine is designed to promote employee engagement through compelling coverage of the people, places and events related to the division.



DPS was also recognized by the Texas Association of State Systems for Computing and Communications (TASSCC) with two awards – the *Excellence Award* and *Rising Star Award*. DPS received the TASSCC *Excellence Award* in the High Value Impact/High Value Business Impact category for the State Police Unified Reporting System (SPURS). Implemented in March 2016, SPURS is an enterprise system created to consolidate and incorporate

all relevant data from multiple law enforcement divisions into a unified

platform.

The TASSCC *Rising Star Award*, which recognizes up and coming government technology leaders who provide and contribute to organizational improvement through the use of technology, was presented to DPS IT developer **Paul Brown**.



B. Case Update

Director Steve McCraw – Introduced CID Major John W? of Eagle Pass. He introduced Texas Ranger Joe



Sanchez and CID Special Agent Chris Hanson. The investigation began in October of 2009. This case involved utilizing Cooperative Individuals (CIs). It demonstrates how violent, deadly and insidious these drug cartels can be. They used school aged students to smuggle and distribute drugs, currency and guns. They controlled the juveniles by luring them into Mexico where they were provided anything that they want including drugs and women. They also intimidated with torture and death, dumping the bodies on the Texas side of the river.

The operation that spanned over 7 years resulted in the following seizures:

121 people arrested
70 juveniles arrested
8,055 lbs. of marijuana
280 kilos of cocaine
22 kilos of meth
9 kilos of heroin
52 firearms
41 assault riffles
49 wire intercepts
Over \$700,000






- · Initiation: June 2009.
- Target: Multiple DTO cells linked to MARCIANO MILLAN-VASQUEZ, mid-level member and "Sicario" (hit man) for the Los Zetas cartel.
- . Areas of Activity: Eagle Pass, Austin, Houston, and Dallas, and other areas outside of TX.
- Investigative Goals: Dismantle/disrupt multiple cells associated with the Los Zetas cartel
 and other cells responsible for the distribution of drugs within the US and the smuggling
 of currency and weapons to Mexico.
- Investigative Techniques: Surveillance, cooperating individuals, cell phone pen registers, Tills, buy-walk operations, and interviews of cooperating defendants and witnesses.
- Agencies Participating: DPS CID, Texas Rangers, DEA, HSI, US Morshals, US Border Patrol, ATFE, FBI, US Customs, Texas National Guard, Guadalupe County Sheriff's Office, Maverick County Sheriff's Office, Maverick County Constable's Office, and the police departments of Austin, San Antonio, Hollywood Park, Castle Hills, Live Oak, Leon Valley, Eagle Pass, Eagle Pass ISD, and Richland (Mississippi).



Texas Ranger Chief Randy Prince introduced Sonny McAfee, Llano County District Attorney, and Texas Ranger Richard Henderson who discussed a homicide investigation and trial. On July 1, 2013, Karra Allen shot and killed her husband as part of a domestic dispute. Mrs. Allen Henderson claimed self-defense, but DA McAfee didn't think something added up. He called upon the Texas Rangers to assist him in recreating the crime scene. Although the crime scene was several months old, using advanced technology tools including Leica Scan and Projectile flight path tracing, the Texas Ranger team was able to assemble a reasonably conclusive trail of evidence that showed that the shooting was deliberate and not an act of self-defense. AD McAfee said that in his 20 years as a law enforcement officer, including several years as a homicide detective in Houston, he had never seen an investigative force as thorough and competent as the DPS team. He thanked the Public Safety Commission for providing the tools and the training that helped him make the conviction.

Commissioner Johnson asked if a motive for the murder was established. DA McAfee suggested that there were probably several motives, not the least of which was greed. Karra Allen owned 51% of the family metal building business which was about to sign a very lucrative government contract.



Crime Scene Reconstruction

- In the Spring of 2015 the District Attorney's Office requested the Rangers conduct a full crime scene reconstruction. This included:
 - A scene diagram
 - Evidence recovery
 - Leica Scan
 - Projectile (bullet) flight path
 - Investigative analysis
 - Expert testimony








Projectile (bullet) flight path



Investigative Analysis

 The Texas Rangers reviewed the entire investigative file, including the Sheriff's Office reports, Autopsy Reports, Confessions, Interviews and crime scene photographs. The analysis lead the Rangers to determine that Brian Allen was unarmed and running away from Karra Allen when he was shot and killed.



C. Review of Testimony to House Appropriations Committee – Report on Efficiency of Expenditure of Border Security Funds



Director Steve McCraw – Texas shares 1,254 miles of border with Mexico and has 14 counties along the Border. Mexican cartels continue to exploit and smuggle people, drugs, guns and money. In July of 2014 DPS began deploying Troopers, Special Agents, and Texas Rangers to the border area to try to stem the tide of this kind of illegal activity. We set priority to the areas of highest activity.

Director McCraw also discussed the fact that when comparing statistics on interdiction, there are often several factors that can affect the numbers, including the political environment in the Central American countries


from which many of the people are fleeing and Mexico's interdiction operations on their border to the south.



Report, discussion, and possible action regarding the proposed Chief Auditor's Office FY 2017 Internal Audit Strategy



Chief Auditor Catherine Melman – laid out her plan for conducting internal audits throughout the department in 2017, including Director McCraw's request for an internal audit of the law enforcement data collection and reporting.

A motion was made by Commissioner Mach and seconded by Commissioner Watson to approve the audit plan as described by Chief Auditor Melman. The motion carried.

Assistant Director Renearl Bowie, Licensing and Regulations – Asked that items 1-5 be considered as a group, and that they be moved to the October PSC Meeting agenda for consideration, allowing staff more time to work on the rule proposals. Commissioner Mach said that if the request to postpone action to approve was granted, that the October report needed to be a solid commitment. AD Bowie assured him that it would be.

A motion was made by Commissioner Johnson, and seconded by Commissioner Mach to table Items 1-5 until the October meeting. The motion carried.

6. Repeal of 37 TAC Chapter 13, Subchapters A – E and H – N and proposed New Subchapters A – D, concerning Controlled Substances Program

Assistant Director Renearl Bowie stated that Item 6 had to do with controlled substances and would bring the rule in compliance with the mandates of HB95 and asked for the Commission's approval to publish it in the Texas Register for public comment.

A motion was made by Comm. Johnson, and seconded by Comm. Mach. Motion carried.

7. New 37 TAC Sections 27.171 – 27.174, concerning Criminal History Clearinghouse *Assistant Director Skyler Hearn – Clean-up of review language.*

A motion was made by Comm. Mach, and seconded by Comm. Flores. The Motion carried.

Assistant Director Joe Peters, Driver License Division – stated that items 1-5 were mostly clean-up language addressing, among other things, the DPS discretion over third party testing. He received one comment from Donald Sparza from the Texas State Trucking Association (TSTA) which he discussed and resolved with him and made no changes to the rules language. AD Peters stated that DPS has 25 CDL testing locations across the state, and the new CDL testing requirements will require approximately double the amount of time for the testing.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the rule modification as presented. The motion carried.

Assistant Director Skyler Hearn, Law Enforcement Support – Clean up language for the Right of Review rule received no Public Comment so he asked for approval.

A motion was made by Comm. Mach, seconded by Comm. Johnson. The Motion carried.

Assistant Director Renearl Bowie, Regulatory Service – Stated that Items A7-A12 were published rules relating to private security and they received no public comments, so he asked the PSC for approval of the rules.

A motion was made by Comm. Mach, and seconded by Comm. Watson. The motion carried.

B. Update report, discussion and possible action regarding recruitment Assistant Director Frank Woodall, Education, Training and Research – AD Woodall introduced General Orlando Salinas to be named as Deputy Assistant Director of Education, Training and Research. Gen. Salinas has worked with DPS on various projects and is know for his integrity and dependability.

AD Woodall went on to say that Recruit Class C-16 is scheduled to graduate on December 16, 2016. C-16 currently has 124 recruits.

Class D-16 begins on September 11, 2016, with a full class of 150 invited. There are also 50 additional recruits that have been approved, but could not fit into the space that we have available. We have asked these 50 who could be available to fill in with a 1 day notice if slots open in the group of 150 within the first week and are prepared to implement this as needed. AD Woodall stated that they generally lose a few recruits during the first week, which primarily deals with paperwork.

Commissioner Johnson applauded AD Woodson for a great idea.

AD Woodall also stated that they have scheduled and are recruiting for schools 18A-E, and have schools scheduled all the way through 2020.
