Twitch streamer Sketch, whose real name is Kylie Cox, revealed that he used to work on OnlyFans as a gay porn creator due to addiction issues. This came after an explicit video from his account leaked onto social media. In a live stream, Sketch apologized for any discomfort caused and thanked friends and family who helped him overcome addiction. The majority of his community showed support, while some criticized him for past sex work. Kris Marshall spoke about reuniting with a Love Actually co-star in Beyond Paradise and shared how he's been busy after a few hectic months. Sketch's revelation about being in gay adult films sent shockwaves through his audience, with some fans and fellow streamers rallying around him while others condemned his actions. FaZe Banks, CEO of FaZe Clan, shared supportive texts with Cox, stating "Sketch was my homie yesterday, he's my homie today, he'll be my homie tomorrow." Notable streamer Kai Cenat criticized online bullies for targeting Cox over a past incident. However, some community members ridiculed Cox, with Sneako accusing him of lying about his life. In response to the backlash, Cox announced a brief break from streaming, but plans to return soon. Kylie Cox, a popular Twitch streamer, recently shared a raw and emotional live-stream about his past struggles with addiction and online reputation. He described creating gay adult film content for OnlyFans as a "dark time" in his life, but emphasized that he has since changed and is seeking help. Cox revealed that he had been living under the threat of his past coming to light on social media for two years, which had taken a significant toll on his mental health. However, with the support of his parents and friends, he feels like he can now move forward. During the live-stream, Cox acknowledged his mistakes and expressed gratitude for those who helped him through a difficult time. He also joked about how he might respond to future leaks or controversies, saying he'd rather be open and honest about his flaws than try to hide behind a facade. Despite facing criticism and scrutiny in the past, Cox reassured his followers that he will continue to stream on Twitch and is committed to being authentic and vulnerable with them. Sketch, a popular Twitch streamer, has faced intense scrutiny over recent allegations regarding his past work as a gay OnlyFans content creator. The rumors surfaced in early July 2024 when YouTuber Pocketbook posted a video claiming to have uncovered Sketch's former identity as a model working under pseudonyms such as Jamiemarhtxxx and Jamiemaratx. The video compared images of Sketch with those from his alleged OnlyFans accounts, highlighting striking similarities between the two. xQc defended fellow streamer Sketch after receiving criticism from BruceDropEmOff about his handling of a controversy. xQc responded to Bruce's comments, stating that the issue shouldn't matter and went on a rant. The conversation was sparked by Bruce's statement "protect my children," which many interpreted as an attempt to belittle others who are advocating for their rights. Some users, like @brndxix, also criticized other streamers for not taking the situation seriously enough, with one user accusing them of pretending to be something they're not for financial gain.
