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Stade Toulousain
Stade Toulousain est un club omnisports français basé à Toulouse dont la section principale est celle du rugby à XV. Il évolue au stade Ernest-Wallon. Le club a remporté 22 fois le championnat de France de rugby à XV et est quintuple champion d'Europe. Le club est présidé par Didier Lacroix depuis 2017. L'équipe première, entraînée par Ugo Mola depuis 2015, évolue en Top 14 et dispute l'Investec Champions Cup. The French rugby club Stade Toulousain has a rich history, having won numerous titles including four Heineken Cup championships and nineteen French Championship titles. They are traditionally one of the main providers for the French national team and have played at various stadiums throughout their history. Before 1907, rugby in Toulouse was only played by students or universities, but in 1893, a group called "l'Olympique Toulousain" was formed. The club went through several name changes before finally becoming known as Stade Toulousain in 1907. Early on, the team had some successful seasons, winning their first national title in 1912 and going on to dominate the sport in the 1920s with five consecutive championships. However, the 1930s and 1950s were relatively quiet periods for the club, with no grand finals until the late 1940s. They did win the championship in 1947 but didn't repeat success for over two decades. The team experienced a resurgence in the 1970s and 1980s, winning their first championship since 1947 in 1985 and successfully defending it the following season. Stade Toulousain won several championships after defeating SU Agen in the final, including the 1988 competition. They also won premierships in 1987 and 1989. The team dominated in the 1990s, winning multiple titles and becoming a major force in European Rugby Cup. \*\*Toulouse Rugby Club Achievements\*\* The club has won several championships, including:
\* Cup Finals Rugby Union titles in 1996, 2003, 2005, 2010, and 2021
\* Runners-up in 2004 and 2008
In addition to its domestic successes, Toulouse has also excelled in international competitions:

Stade Toulousain is widely regarded as one of the most successful rugby union clubs in the world. With a massive following in Europe and significant social media and brand presence, the team's home ground, Stade Ernest-Wallon, hosts some of the biggest matches, including Top 14 games and European competitions. The club colours are red, black, and white, inspired by the ceremonial attire of the capitouls of Toulouse. The team's history dates back to 1893, when students from the Lycée de Toulouse formed "Les Sans-Soucis" and later became part of "l'Olympique Toulousain", which merged with other teams in 1907 to form Stade Toulousain. The club's crest features the initials of Thomas Aquinas, a reference to the city's historical connection to the philosopher. Stade Toulousain has won numerous championships, including five titles between 1922 and 1927, during its golden era in the 1920s. Although it experienced a quiet period in the following decades, the team returned to prominence in the late 1940s, winning the championship in 1947. Toulouse's Wait Ends, Dominance Continues
The wait is finally over for Toulouse as they claimed their first championship since 1947 in 1985. After a series of defeats in previous years, they defeated RC Toulon in the final to take home the title. This marked the beginning of a successful period for the club, with them going on to defend their championship in the following season. The 1990s saw Stade Toulousain become a major force once again, winning four premierships in a row between 1994 and 1997. They also claimed the Challenge Yves du Manoir in 1995, defeating Castres 13 to 8 in the final. The club's success extended to European Rugby Cup as well, with them becoming the first ever champions in the 1995-96 season. The late 1990s and 2000s saw Toulouse continue their dominance, winning the Challenge Yves du Manoir in 1998 and 1999, as well as the 2001 championship. They also replicated this success in the European Rugby Cup, winning the 2002-03 and 2004-05 cups. Toulouse's Heineken Cup title drought finally came to an end in 2010, with them defeating Leinster to reach the final where they faced Biarritz Olympique at Stade de France. They won the game by 21-19 to claim their fourth Heineke
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Toulouse regained its former glory in 2019, claiming the French championship title and later achieving a historic double by winning both the 2021 Champions Cup and the 2021 Top 14. This achievement marked their latest title win against La Rochelle, securing a spot as the top-ranked team in Europe. The Stade Ernest-Wallon Stadium de Toulouse, home to Stade Toulousain, is one of the few clubs with its own stadium. Built in the late 1980s, it has undergone renovations and now boasts a capacity of 19,500 seats. While the stadium can accommodate most fans, larger events may require a relocation to Stadium de Toulouse, which offers more space.
Toulouse Olympique, the rugby league team, shares this stadium as their home venue since February 2020. Notably, Stade Toulousain has an impressive record in European competitions, having won the Heineken Cup/European Rugby Champions Cup six times and holding the top spot for winning over 100 games. Their performance is all the more remarkable given they have completed "the Double" - winning both national championships and European competitions - a record three times.

With a strong online presence and dedicated fan base, Stade Toulousain continues to thrive as a leading rugby club. The team's success is reflected in its social media following, with fans eagerly supporting the team through various platforms. As one of the most beloved teams in France, Stade Toulousain's popularity extends beyond the country, solidifying its position as a prominent force in the world of rugby.
