The movie was filmed in Long Beach, California and Los Angeles, California from January 16, 2004. The real Ken Carter chose Samuel L. Jackson to play him in the film, which he said is 98.5% accurate. Before filming started, actors had to attend a three-week basketball camp and practice for five hours a day. The film was Channing Tatum's movie debut, as he had never played basketball before. Choreographer Mark Ellis turned down Friday Night Lights to work on Coach Carter instead. The actors learned 70 plays for the movie, which highlighted teamwork and gameplay tailored to each actor's strengths and weaknesses. Coach Carter was one of the first sports movies to use 3D digital mapping technology. Coach Carter premiered in cinemas on January 14, 2005 and opened in 1st place, grossing \$24.2 million from 2,524 locations. The film earned \$67,264,877 in total ticket sales domestically. It received generally positive reviews from critics, with a rating of 65% on Rotten Tomatoes and a score of 57 out of 100 on Metacritic. The film received mixed reviews, with Peter Travers from Rolling Stone giving it two and a half stars, praising Samuel L. Jackson's performance as Ken Carter, a real-life high-school basketball coach. Despite its lengthy runtime of 135 minutes, the movie was criticized for relying on sports-drama cliches. However, the film earned several award nominations in 2005-06, including BET Awards, Black Movie Awards, and NAACP Image Awards. Samuel L. Jackson won the Outstanding Actor in a Motion Picture award at the NAACP Image Awards, while Thomas Carter won the Best Director award at the Black Reel Awards. The film also received nominations for Best Sports Movie at the ESPY Awards and Favorite Movie Drama at the People's Choice Awards. Ashanti was nominated for Breakthrough Female at the MTV Movie Awards and Choice Movie Breakout Performance - Female at the Teen Choice Awards.
