Le prix de l'abonnement classique de l'Olympique Lyonnais est passé à 530 euros, soit 20 euros de moins que la saison précédente. C'est une décision qui contraste avec celle prise l'année dernière, où les prix avaient augmenté alors que la Ligue 1 comptait désormais 18 clubs, dont deux matchs de championnat en moins à domicile. In June 2019, OL Groupe picked up a 25% stake in French basketball club ASVEL Basket for €3.4 million and a 10% stake in its women's team for €300,000.[11] The group also unveiled plans for a €100 million performance hall near the stadium that could host concerts for 16,000 people and sporting events for up to 12,000 people, making it suitable for ASVEL Basket to play matches there.[12][13] Tony Parker, former National Basketball Association player, was president of the club and majority shareholder of ASVEL Basket, and became an ambassador of the OL brand in the United States.[14] By December 2020, OL Groupe had acquired an additional 6.3% stake in ASVEL Basket's men's team, bringing its total stake to 31.67%. As of February 2023[update], OL Groupe's stake was 33%, and Parker was reportedly considering selling his stake.[16] In October 2019, OL Groupe announced record turnover of €309 million and aimed to reach €400 million in revenue by 2024.[17] OL Groupe president Jean-Michel Aulas also announced negotiations for the acquisition of an unnamed women's football franchise playing in United States' top-division league, the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL).[18] In November 2019, OL Groupe announced exclusive discussions to acquire Reign FC, a NWSL club based in Tacoma, Washington.[19] The acquisition was completed on December 19, 2019, for \$3.51 million, and the team was rebranded as OL Reign. OL Groupe held an 89.5% stake in the company through American holding company OL Groupe LLC, with former Reign owner Bill Predmore retaining a 7.5% stake. Tony Parker also acquired a 3% stake in Reign FC as part of the deal. Due to the NWSL's American franchise structure, OL Groupe indirectly became a shareholder in the league.[20] On January 7, 2020, eSport's club Team LDLC renamed to LDLC OL as part of a partnership with Olympique Lyonnais. The partnership ended on May 16, 2023, and the club would cease operations by the end of July 2023.[21] OL Groupe has held various stakes in other companies, including a 51% stake in the Medical Academy of Football (Académie Médicale de Football), a stake in futsal and entertainment center chain Le Five, a stake in amusement park SCI Too Fun Parc, and a 10% stake in Brazilian football club Resende FC.[22] On June 21, 2022, OL Groupe announced the pending or eventual sale of all shares held by Aulas's holding company Holnest, Pathé, and IDG Capital to Eagle Football Holdings, LLC, a holding company controlled by American businessman John Textor. OL Reign, a US women's soccer club, was sold to Kang and his holding company for \$54.4 million, with the European side valued at this price. Meanwhile, OL Reign itself is expected to sell for €50 million. The sale of both clubs is pending approval from the NWSL and French regulators. In other news, OL Groupe's financial overseers have warned that the club will face sanctions if it fails to account for €60 million by June 30th. The sanctions include supervision over Lyon's wage bill and transfers. It's worth noting that the sale of OL Reign has been subject to multiple offers, with a minimum price of \$53 million. However, no deal has been finalized yet, as the current CEO, Santiago Cucci, has stated that the club is not yet sold. Cucci, who previously ran an American clothing brand, does not have prior experience in football. On July 4, 2023, Santiago Cucci was appointed as the new president of OL Groupe, succeeding Jean-Michel Aulas. Football originated from various forms of ball games practiced in different cultures, including Ancient Greece, Rome, Japan, and Aboriginal Australia. Football's global reach can be seen in its history, with only a handful of national teams existing in the late 19th century. Today, FIFA comprises 211 member associations from around the world. The sport has become increasingly globalized, evident in the growing number of nations participating in World Cup qualifiers, which rose from 32 in 1934 to over 200 in 2014. Six confederations govern football worldwide: CAF (Africa), AFC (Asia), UEFA (Europe), CONCACAF (North and Central America and Caribbean), OFC (Oceania), and CONMEBOL (South America).
