Each table demands six mahogany planks and provides substantial XP, although this method is quite expensive if relying solely on buying materials. For those without a significant bank balance, an alternative exists: using the Mahogany Homes construction minigame found throughout Varrock, Falador, Hosidius, and East Ardougne. This game involves completing contracts for various NPCs, offering a slow but cost-effective way to level up construction skills. You can easily complete between 50-60 contracts per hour, which translates to at least 137k construction XP. To get the fastest Construction skill level in Gielinor, consider the following options: Getting Construction to level 99 can be achieved with minimal time investment of around 16 hours, utilizing Mahogany Plank. However, due to its high cost and click-intensive nature, the Construction skill is not ideal for many players. But with the release of Mahogany Homes by Jagex, the process has become more efficient. A player-owned house can be obtained through completing a mini-quest called Daddy's Home, which also serves as an introduction to Mahogany Homes. Traditional training involves building and removing furniture within your house repeatedly, resulting in faster XP per hour but at higher costs. On the other hand, Mahogany Homes require you to repair furniture in various houses across the map, offering slower progress but less expenditure. As a player progresses through Construction skill levels, they have two primary options: traditional training or Mahogany Homes. To start building furniture, enter your home and right-click on empty spaces. Select what you want to build, and when done, remove it to construct another piece. Begin with basic wooden chairs and bookcases. To progress, exit your house and collect planks by unnoting at Phials at level 9. Follow the pathway to reach levels 33-74, where oak larders become the most efficient training method. At this point, you need a workshop room and dining area. In resizable mode, use keyboard shortcuts to navigate menus and speed up your experience. Hire a servant between levels 33-40, but those below human servants are slower. After level 40, create bedrooms with beds, then visit the Ardougne Servants Guild. Fire the initial butler and hire the demon butler at level 50 for faster efficiency. To maximize training, ask your servant to retrieve planks from the bank during their absence. Each 8 trips to the bank triggers payment requests, requiring coins in your inventory. Build a servant's moneybag at level 58 construction to automate these payments and speed up your progress. Building mythical capes is a cost-effective way to get experience points (XP) in the game. To do this, you need to reach level 50. The method uses teak planks, which are cheaper than regular training but still offer more XP per plank compared to other traditional construction methods. Firstly, you need to build a quest hall room in your house for 25k and then find your servant to go to the bank and retrieve teak planks. Next, select Build on the guild trophy Construction space and choose to build a mounted mythical cape. This method uses 3 planks plus a mythical cape and returns it once you remove it. Using fewer planks than other methods makes this viable with just a human butler, saving you money in the long run. The total cost for getting to 99 is around 86 million. In comparison, building mahogany furniture offers the fastest experience with up to 900k XP per hour at level 52 when making mahogany dining tables. However, this requires a kitchen room and using a demon butler is recommended. Building gnome benches unlocks at level 77 and uses mahogany planks like dining tables but with better rates. Using teak planks provides an alternative cheaper method that's slightly slower than the other options. The fastest way to build them are in superior garden rooms unlocked at level 66, requiring a room costing 75k. Since both benches are near each other you can open the menu for one bench while removing the other giving faster overall experience. You pay around 118 million to get 99 teak planks. Building oak dungeon doors is an option at 74 construction using 10 planks and less expensive than regular training methods but slightly slower. It requires building a dungeon room, a demon butler, and it costs around 98 million. Using a bench on another player's character to remove it while they are using the next menu nets around 1.1 million XP per hour. This is currently the fastest viable method for achieving 99 Construction in the game, replacing traditional methods which should be avoided. Mahogany Homes offer an alternative construction training method that may be considered as the journey towards reaching 99 Construction progresses.
