Who collects campbell soup labels

This community-driven initiative allowed students, families, and local residents to work together towards a common goal. To participate, individuals would collect labels throughout the school year and then submit them to their designated school using a Pledge Form. The collected labels could be redeemed for educational merchandise, promoting a fun and easy way to support local schools. However, it's essential to note that the program has undergone significant changes. To ensure the labels were processed efficiently, participants were instructed to follow specific guidelines: printing and completing the Pledge Form, bundling the labels neatly without bagging them, and using recyclable materials like white string or rubber bands to secure the bundles. The Labels for Education program accepted labels from a wide range of Campbell's products, including soups, pasta sauces, broths, and juices. Although the program has been discontinued, its legacy lives on, having contributed over \$110 million in school supplies to thousands of schools across the United States. Those interested in supporting local educational initiatives can explore alternative options, such as donating collected labels to nearby schools or community programs. However, it's worth noting that the Labels for Education program has been discontinued by Campbell's. Some people suggest recycling the labels or selling them online through platforms like eBay or Etsy, especially since there was a craze of using labels in junk journals a few years ago. Others propose using them as part of a decoupage project or simply throwing them away if they don't hold sentimental value. One user mentioned saving labels for 30 years and is now unsure what to do with them, while another person's husband wants her to burn the accumulated stack. Another idea is to donate the labels to a local church that might be able to use them for a good cause. You can check with local churches or schools to see if they participate in charity programs, so you won't need to mail labels unless you have a preferred charity. Some people used to save labels and donate them to their kids' school, but now they might just throw them away and reminisce about the past. Campbell Canada's Labels for Education program has been realigning its initiatives towards social responsibility and community hunger alleviation. You can help by collecting Campbell's labels and General Mills Box Tops for Education, which bring rewards to the program. The Labels for Education program allows you to save labels, lids, and UPCs from hundreds of Campbell's items, and the Box Tops program pays 10 cents per label.
