## Cyberchase episode guide

Cyberchase is an animated math series that airs on PBS Kids, revolving around three Earth children who use mathematics and problem-solving skills to save Cyberspace from The Hacker. Each episode features a live-action For Real interstitial before the credits, hosted by young actors exploring the episode's math topic in real life. The show has been on hiatus but returned for seasons 9-15, with new episodes focusing on health, math, and the environment. The series premiered in December 2001 with three webisodes called "How It All Started" and expanded to "Web Adventures" by April 13, 2003. Additional webisodes were added, including "NUMBERLESS PUZZLES!" and "HACKER JACK". The webisodes page was eventually changed into a redirect to the Math Games page in 2011. The final season co-directed by Yvette Kaplan was a blast. Most episodes were directed by Larry Jacobs, marking the end of his tenure as episode director. This season saw a special two-hour program, "My Big Idea!", which showcased kid-inventors and featured Bianca and Harry from Cyberchase For Real! as hosts. Len Carlson's iconic voice was replaced halfway through by Philip Williams after Carlson's passing in 2006. The season also marked Nelvana Limited's last traditionally animated episodes before switching to Flash animation with PIP Animation Services starting the next season. The following year, Season 6 kicked off with Jason Groh directing all episodes and Buzz voiced by Philip Williams from start to finish. Brandon Lloyd took over as director for Seasons 7-8, introducing Janice Huff, a meteorologist, in the first two episodes. After an eight-year hiatus, the series returned for its ninth season, which premiered on November 4, 2013. Season 9 saw changes galore! Harley, Alicia, and Harry from For Real moved to Camp Henry, teaching young environmentalists about conservation. The season was animated by Pip Animation in Ottawa and directed by J. Meeka Stuart. Notably, this season marked the end of Fullscreen and introduced a new widescreen format. Let's get those Cyberchase vibes going! This season of Cyberchase was directed by J. Meeka Stuart. More information about this season is available. This is the final season where Gilbert Gottfried voiced Digit before his death on April 12, 2022. Following Gottfried's passing, Ron Pardo now provides Digit's voice. This season marks the last appearance of Phillip Williams as Buzz before his death on September 8, 2024. Between 2004 and 2005, five Cyberchase titles were released on DVD and VHS. Cyberchase is a children's television series that aims to educate kids on basic science concepts, including math and environmental science. The show follows the adventures of three kids, Jackie, Matt, Inez, and their bird friend Digit, as they save cyberspace from the evil Hacker. The long-running PBS Kids series "Cyberchase" has been entertaining and educating audiences for over two decades. Produced by Nelvana and Thirteen/WNET New York, this show is currently the second-longest running PBS Kids series after Sesame Street, and was formerly third to Arthur. The main plot follows three Earth children - Inez, Jackie, and Matt - along with their robotic cybird friend Digit as they protect Cyberspace and its ruler Motherboard from villainous Hacker's plans. Each episode typically involves developing and applying STEM concepts under time pressure to thwart Hacker's schemes. After each episode is a live-action segment called "Cyberchase For Real" that demonstrates the same topic in a more practical context. The show's website, Cyberchase Online, hosts interactive and supplementary materials such as games and activities. The learning goals of "Cyberchase" are to demonstrate the usefulness and universality of math, foster enthusiasm and confidence for the subject, and help improve problem-solving skills. The content is designed to reflect national curriculum standards and has been vetted by formative and summative research. Dr. Marbles, Motherboard's chief technician, created Hacker as an assistant, who in turn created Digit. However, Hacker grew greedy and began plotting to take over Cyberspace. He intended to use the Transformatron to defeat Motherboard, but Coop, its co-creator, destroyed the blueprints and hid the components. In retaliation, Hacker corrupted Coop with magnetite. When Hacker was caught removing Motherboard's Encryptor Chip, Dr. Marbles drained his battery and Motherboard banished him to the Northern Frontier. Hacker later created Buzz and Delete as his new henchmen. Hacker eventually found a way to create a breach in Cyberspace near Motherboard Control Central by having Inez, Jackie, and Matt touch a real-world library computer map at the same time. This allowed Hacker to send Motherboard a virus while she was undergoing an upgrade and had her firewall down. Motherboard suffered partial damage, and her Encryptor Chip was destroyed. She summoned the Earth children to Cyberspace, and they teamed up with Digit to undo Hacker's damage, forming the CyberSquad. Hacker creates many schemes to usurp Motherboard or specific cybersites, which the CyberSquad almost always foils. Both are in search of Professor Archimedes' new Encryptor Chip, which can be used to cure Motherboard's virus. Wicked becomes a secondary antagonist who initially has feelings for Hacker but eventually becomes his rival. The CyberSquad also meets Coop's abandoned son, Slider, who is searching for his father. Slider's search seemingly leads to the Encryptor Chip, which is being auctioned off. Cyberchase's Pilot Episodes & Production Details The pilot episodes of "The Poddleville Case" and "Bridge" were evaluated, with some character designs tweaked. Hacker had two early design concepts, one with a similar head to his final design. In May 1999, test-screening took place in select schools for the pilot episode of "The Poddleville Case". The series' plot was also explained during this time. A website launch occurred around the same period. Season 1 production was taken over by Nelvana, with Canada-based company handling it instead of Curious Pictures. Work on episodes such as "Lost My Marbles" and "Snow Day to be Exact" began in early 2000. By February 15th, 2000, funding for new episode development was secured. New character Digit had been added by this point. Storyboards were tested in schools before the show's release. Nelvana received funding for 25 episodes at this time. Target audience was revised to eight- to eleven-year-olds. Outreach plans included a Weekly Reader insert and activities in after-school programs. By June 2001, around 14 episodes had been completed. "Castleblanca" was almost finished with storyboarding when it underwent public evaluation. Universe The 2D characters and props use a thick outer outline with cel shading. In Season 6, the effect was changed to a more subtle blurred internal drop shadow when using rigged animation. Background art varies between lined and lineless designs, especially in earlier seasons. Reception Cyberchase is rated four out of five stars for ages 5 and up on Common Sense Media. The show has won several awards including a CINE Golden Eagle Award in 2006, a Daytime Emmy Award in 2007, and an Environmental Media Award in 2016. The animated series and the wider Cyberchase brand have received numerous recommendations and honors from Parents' Choice Awards.
