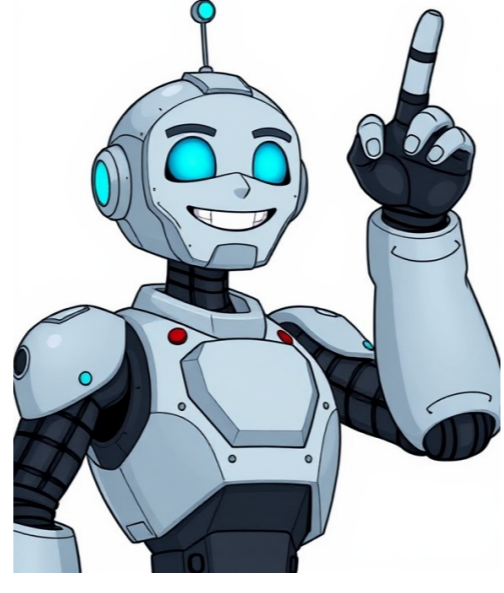


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Looking into the dark history of a Mormon cult in Utah ===== Val Snow, 35, recounts his childhood in The Order, a strict Mormon community where polygamy and incest were practiced to maintain "bloodlines pure." Born in this environment, Val grew up with 14 mothers and 163 siblings, all sharing a unique bond shaped by the abusive leader, John Daniel Kingston. Val's experience with the Kingston Group, a Mormon fundamentalist sect, left him with deep scars. He recalled the day Daniel, his father, took him to the ranch under false pretenses at age 14, where he was subjected to physical and sexual abuse. Val had signed a form to leave the cult but not before facing years of emotional trauma. Val explained that the Kingston Group's isolation from society made it difficult for its members to connect with outsiders. "You don't get too close; you can't be friends with them," he said, highlighting the group's teachings that discouraged intimacy with non-members. The sect's banking system was another aspect of Val's experience. All earnings went to The Order's bank, and members only saw their account balances monthly. Val believed this was done to keep money from being seized by authorities. Val also spoke about Daniel's physical abuse, which included beating him as a child while he wore an ankle monitor due to prison work release. Beyond the physical abuse, Val experienced sexual abuse from his father, who seemed to derive pleasure from making someone suffer. Val shared an incident where Daniel used the opportunity to teach him how to drive a truck at age 14, leading to molestation and subsequent beating. Despite this, Val's mother intervened, and he was not forced to return to the ranch. Sex education was nonexistent in The Order, and mothers were often absent or uninvolved. This created an environment where children like Val were vulnerable to abuse. When Val came out as gay, his father kicked him out of the family and church, pushing him towards conversion therapy. Val eventually left the cult in 2011 and found solace in creating content that promotes self-love and acceptance. His younger sister Shanell also broke free from the Kingston Group after being forced to marry her first cousin at age 18. She has since appeared on the Lifetime reality series Escaping Polygamy, sharing her own story of survival. Val's story serves as a reminder of the devastating consequences of cults like the Kingston Group, where emotional and physical abuse can be inflicted under the guise of "religion" or "family values." The dark secrets of a Mormon cult: A product of incest ===== Yates had been living with Butler since 2007 without her family's knowledge. In 2008, Yates announced she had a new boyfriend named Andrew Bicknell, but he was actually her father. Police found love letters and explicit images on their mobile phones and laptops. Yates' stepsister Natalie visited their flat in 2010 and discovered explicit photos of the pair on Yates' phone. Robinson's parents were half-siblings. He underwent a blood test at age ten to determine which extended family member he could marry within the Kingston Group, a polygamist cult that operates in Salt Lake City, Utah. The Kingston Group is a polygamous and incestuous clan. Its leader, Paul Elden Kingston, lives by an extrapolation of the Book of Mormon called the White Horse Prophecy, which predicts a cataclysmic time when the "black race" will rise up and attempt to destroy the white man. The Kingston Group's Incestuous Practices Exposed Growing up in the Kingston Group cult, Val Snow sometimes found himself developing crushes on family members. "There was one crush I had in the Order," he revealed, adding that it was his cousin. In 2013, Rae left the group, becoming her father Paul's first child to do so. Meanwhile, Robinson was kicked out of the cult at 20 for complaining about treatment for his mother's cancer. Members often avoid hospitals due to fears that government-backed doctors might expose their incestuous relationships or inject them with a disease. Robinson's mother passed away shortly after he broke off from the Order. During a live stream, Rae addressed witnessing congenital disabilities in children born of incest. "I saw kids being born with missing ears and things like that," she said, noting that blood tests were rare cases of this phenomenon. They were isolated from the rest of society, only interacting among themselves. He briefly explained the banking system, where earnings went to The Order's bank, and members received monthly account balances. Val shared memories of Daniel's physical abuse, saying he was beaten in his office as a child. He also talked about sexual abuse by his father, adding that his father found pleasure in the pain. He recalled a truck drive with Daniel, who was supposed to teach him how to drive. However, it turned into an experience where Val got molested and beaten afterwards. Daniel left him alone in the field to finish moving water lines at their farm. Val stated he had no idea what happened, as there was no sex education. Val also spoke about coming to terms with his homosexuality while growing up in the Mormon church. He initially thought attraction would come with marriage, but admitted it didn't work that way. His father's reaction when he found out was severe - he kicked him out of the family and church, urging conversion therapy.
