The series' first four arcs have been adapted into separate manga series. The first, by Daichi Matsue, was published between June 2014 and March 2015. The second, by Makoto Fugetsu, has been published by Square Enix between October 2014 and January 2017. The third, also by Matsue, was also published between May 2015 and September 2019. The fourth, by Haruno Atoni, with composition by Yu Aikawa, has been published since September 2019. Additionally, Media Factory has published two anthology manga with stories by different artists. An anime television series adaptation produced by White Fox aired from April to September 2016, starting with an hour-long special. Two original video animation (OVA) episodes were released in October 2018 and November 2019. In March 2017, game developer 5pb. released a visual novel based on the series. A second season aired in a split-cour format, with the first half airing from July to September 2020, and the second half airing from January to March 2021. A third season also premiered in a split-cour format, with the first half airing from October to November 2024, and the second half airing from February to March 2025. A fourth season is set to premiere in 2026. The novels and all three manga adaptations are published in North America by Yen Press. The anime adaptation has been streamed by Crunchyroll outside Asia, which released the anime on home video through Funimation in the United States and Anime Limited in the United Kingdom. In Southeast Asia and South Asia, the series is licensed by Muse Communication. The overall series (light novel and manga volumes) had over 13 million copies in circulation by March 2023 (including digital versions), while the anime series has sold more than 70,000 copies on home video. The light novels have been praised for their fresh take on the "another world" concept, fleshed-out characters, complex world and lore, and thought-provoking topics and themes. The series received awards at the 2015–2016 Newtype Anime Awards and the 2017 Sugoi Japan Awards, and was nominated for Anime of the Year at the Crunchyroll's ===== Subaru Natsuki's Journey in Re:Zero Subaru Natsuki, a NEET, finds himself transported to a fantasy world. His attempt to aid Emilia, a half-elf with ambitions to become the ruler of Lugunica, ends in tragedy when he dies shortly after arrival. However, Subaru soon discovers that he can travel back in time after his death, allowing him to protect and support Emilia as she seeks her goal. In gratitude for his help, Subaru resides in one of Roswaal's mansions, using his unique ability to aid Emilia's ambitions while also assisting other friends who cross their paths. Nonetheless, Subaru suffers from physical pain with each death and carries memories that only he recalls. The story began as fan fiction on the website Shōsetsuka ni Narō ("Let's Become Novelists"), inspired by Tappei Nagatsuki's initial isekai concept. Initially serialized in 2012, Masahito Ikemoto became aware of the web novel and was impressed by its use of Return by Death. Working with Nagatsuki to adapt the series into a light novel led to significant editing, including a substantial reduction in worldbuilding details. Illustrator Shin'ichirō Ōtsuka drew character designs for Subaru and Emilia after reading the web novel. Ikemoto requested changes to make the characters more relatable during emotional scenes, adding features that made them more appealing. The development of Ram and Rem's designs was also revised, incorporating characteristic hair parts and maid uniforms. The possibility of an anime adaptation arose early in the series' development. Producer Shō Tanaka recommended reading Nagatsuki's web novels to Ikemoto, who soon realized that Re:Zero could be adapted into an animated series. ===== Ikemoto and Tanaka approached White Fox studio about adapting their series into an anime. The studio president was impressed with the series and its potential for animation, but only if it conformed to broadcasting regulations. Production started after the release of the fifth novel in October 2014. Masaharu Watanabe was chosen as director due to his experience working at White Fox, while Kyūta Sakai became character designer and chief animation director after Yoshikawa deemed her suitable for the task. Masahiro Yokotani joined as main writer, but only read the first novel initially, unaware of the violent content in later books. Yoshiko Nakamura joined later and struggled to write scripts alone, so another scriptwriter was brought on board. Eiji Umehara was chosen after working with Nagatsuki on Chaos;Child, and Umehara wrote some of the more intense scenes. Tappei Nagatsuki, the original author, was actively involved in production, attending script meetings and recording sessions. The anime was initially planned for 25 episodes but was extended to accommodate more content, particularly the final battle against the White Whale. Watanabe's goal was to capture the mood of the novel, and the staff worked hard to compress dense source material without losing key elements of the story. The conclusion proved difficult to plan, with significant time devoted to deciding what to include in the final episode. Nakamura and Umehara had to adjust their views of the main character, Subaru, and rewrite scenes where they portrayed him as "cool". ===== Rewritten text: To recreate Subaru's retelling of The Red Ogre Who Cried in episode 6 multiple times,[12] the staff encountered difficulty deciding on a theme song to use for Subaru's ringtone that plays during the closing scene of episode 19, considering options like "Kanpaku Sengen", "The Beard Song", and "M" by Princess Princess, before settling on "Yoake no Michi" from Dog of Flanders.[12] When selecting a composer to create the series' soundtrack, director Watanabe aimed for someone who had struck a chord with him. A fan of drama series, Watanabe was inspired by a piece of music in the medical drama Death's Organ, and discovered that the series' composer, Kenichiro Suehiro, had also worked on several of his favorite anime and drama series.[17] After Suehiro joined the production, Watanabe provided him with three key guidelines: use human voices during Return by Death sequences; compose music like he would for a drama or movie to capture emotional scenes; and "pull all the stops" for suspenseful scenes.[17] Additionally, for the first cour, Watanabe requested music with a suspenseful vibe, while asking for music with a romantic feel for the second cour.[17] Both Watanabe and Suehiro admire Italian composer Ennio Morricone, and Suehiro drew inspiration from his works while composing the soundtrack.[17] Watanabe also sought songs that mirrored Hans Zimmer's score from The Dark Knight.[17] While Suehiro used music not very 'anime-ish' during most of the series, he was asked to use more traditional anime music in slice-of-life scenes.[17] On several occasions, such as in episodes 7 and 15, Watanabe made it a point to use an entire song, something unusual in most anime.[17] The series makes limited use of its opening and ending themes, and Watanabe wished he could have used them more frequently.[9] Initially, the Re:Zero web novel was serialized by Tappei Nagatsuki on the user-generated content site Shōsetsuka ni Narō from April 20, 2012, onwards.[19][20] As of June 2, 2024, eight story arcs have been completed and five "EX" side stories have been published, with the ninth arc in progress. In total, the webnovel has 609 chapters available.[20] Following its publication, Media Factory acquired the series for print publication.[19] The first light novel volume, featuring illustrations by Shin'ichirō Ōtsuka, was published on January 24, 2014, under their MF Bunko J imprint.[21] As of June 2025, 41 volumes have been published, along with six side story volumes and twelve short story collections.[22] Nagatsuki and Ōtsuka began publishing short side-stories focused on series characters in Monthly Comic Alive, starting with Elsa in August 2016.[23][24] The light novels are published in English by Yen Press, who announced their acquisition of the license via Twitter on December 2, 2015.[25]Re:Zero -Starting Life in Another World- Manga and Anime Adaptations Continue to Thrive ===== The Re:Zero franchise continues to expand with new manga, anime, and other adaptations. The series has licensed by Yen Press for its manga and anime adaptations. A second manga began serialization in Square Enix's seinen magazine Monthly Big Gangan on October 25, 2014, titled Re:Zero -Starting Life in Another World-. Chapter 2: One Week at the Mansion. The final chapter was published on December 24, 2016, and an extra chapter was published on January 25, 2017. The third manga by Matsue, titled Re:Zero - Starting Life in Another World-, Chapter 3: Truth of Zero, began serialization in Comic Alive's July 2015 issue on May 27, 2015. The final chapter was published on September 27, 2019. Yen Press also publishes the third adaptation. A fourth manga, titled Re:Zero -Starting Life in Another World- Chapter 4: The Sanctuary and the Witch of Greed, with art by Haruno Atoni and composition by Yu Aikawa began serialization in Comic Alive's November 2019 issue on September 27, 2019. A fifth manga, titled Re:Zero -Starting Life in Another World- Chapter 5: Stars that Engrave History began serialization under the Comic Alive+ label on the ComicWalker website on February 19, 2024. A manga anthology, titled Re:Zero -Starting Life in Another World: Official Anthology Comic was published by Media Factory on June 23, 2016. A second anthology was published on September 23, 2017. ===== The 25-episode series of prop design premiered on TV Tokyo and other channels on April 4, 2016. The first episode was extended to 50 minutes. A special anime short series titled Re:Zero ~Starting Break Time From Zero~ accompanied the series. It featured chibi versions of the characters and consisted of eleven episodes. Later, a new short series titled Re:PETIT ~Starting Life in Another World from PETIT~ started airing on June 24, 2016. The shorts were directed by Minoru Ashina and produced by Studio Puyukai. They were later broadcast on AT-X after each episode of the regular series. An original video animation (OVA) episode titled Memory Snow was announced in September 2017. It was screened in Japanese theaters starting from October 6, 2018. A second OVA titled The Frozen Bond was also released, focusing on the meeting of Emilia and Puck. The series has been licensed by various companies including Crunchyroll and Funimation for streaming and home video releases outside of Asia. Funimation announced a partnership with Muse Communication in Southeast Asia and South Asia to release the series in these regions. Season 1 was released on DVD and Blu-ray in North America, with negative reviews due to visible color banding and compression artifacts. However, both Funimation and Anime Limited's Season 1 Part 1 Blu-ray releases were later made available for purchase.The Re: Life in a Different World from Zero anime series has had several premieres and releases since its initial broadcast in 2019. The first season premiered on April 9, 2019, and was followed by a second season that aired in 2020. A theatrical film adaptation was released in 2022. A third season of the anime was announced at AnimeJapan 2023 and is set to premiere in 2026. The new season will be animated by White Fox and directed by Masahiro Shinohara, with Haruka Sagawa serving as character designer. The first part of the third season, titled "Attack Arc", ran from October 2 to November 20, 2024. The second part, titled "Counterattack Arc", aired from February 5 to March 26, 2025. The series has also become part of Isekai Quartet, a crossover comedy series featuring characters drawn in a chibi style. It includes characters from the light novel series KonoSuba, Overlord, and The Saga of Tanya the Evil, all published by Kadokawa Corporation. ===== The series has released several singles and theme songs, including "Redo", which was Suzuki's 10th single. Another mobile game that made by Sega titled Re:Zero ~ Starting Life in Another World: Lost in Memories (Re:ゼロから始める異世界生活 Lost in Memories, Ri:Zero kara Hajimeru Isekai Seikatsu Lost in Memories) was released for Android and iOS on September 9, 2020.[125] In the game, the player can become protagonist Subaru Natsuki and relive the story of the anime. From there, the player can branch into "What If" stories. Furthermore, a new story original to the game was produced under the full supervision of original author Tappei Nagatsuki.[126] A tactical adventure video game was developed by Chime and published by Spike Chunsoft titled Re:Zero ~ Starting Life in Another World: The Prophecy of the Throne (Re:ゼロから始める異世界生活 傳りの王選候補, Ri:Zero kara Hajimeru Isekai Seikatsu Tsuwarino-ō Sen kōho) and was released for PlayStation 4, PC, and Nintendo Switch in January 2021.[127] The game has an original story and was produced under the full supervision of original author Tappei Nagatsuki and illustrated by the series' illustrator Shinichou Ōtsuka. It is the first official Re:Zero game to have an English release. A role-playing browser game called Re:Zero -Starting Life in Another World- Forbidden Book and the Mysterious Spirit that was made by DMM Games released on July 14, 2021, in Japan. On March 14, 2022, DMM Games has announced the game will be shut down on July 14, 2022.[128] A mobile game called Re:Zero ~ Starting Life in Another World: Witch's Re:surrection was announced at the series' stage in AnimeJapan 2023.[129] It was released for iOS and Android on August 26, 2024.[130] Kadokawa published a 272-page guide to the series' first three arcs, titled Re:zeropedia, alongside the 10th volume of the novels on October 24, 2016.[131] An official dōjinshi art book was published at Comiket, with art by Ponkan 8 (Shirobako and My Youth Romantic Comedy Is Wrong, As I Expected), Yuka Nakajima (Listen to Me, Girls. I Am Your Father!, Amagi Brilliant Park), and TakayaKi (Arifureta Shokugyou de Sekai Saikyou).[132] A crossover with Natsume Akatsuki's light novel series KonoSuba, titled Re:Starting Life Blessing This World was published on December 21, 2016.[133] The book featured interviews with each series' authors and illustrators, as well as the principal voice actors in their respective anime adaptations. In 2016, Re-zero was the tenth best-selling light novel series in Japan, selling 263,357 copies between November 2015 and May 2016. The first two volumes were the 35th and 48th best-selling volumes, respectively. During this period, the series ranked fourth for overall sales, with 1,007,381 copies sold. In 2017, Re-zero was the third best-selling series in Japan, selling 925,671 copies between November 2016 and May 2017. Games, which manufactures video games, and 5pb. Records, which is the record label. In 2011, a group of companies merged under Mages Inc., led by Chiyoumaru Shikura. Mages has had several changes in its ownership and structure over the years. In 2009, Chiyoumaru Shikura purchased the remaining rights from the TYO Group, allowing him to co-own 5pb. with AGOne, an affiliate of Dwango Japan. Staff members include scenario writer Naotaka Hayashi, artist Yukihiro Matsuo, and producer Tatsuya Matsuhara. In April 2011, a group of companies merged under Mages Inc., led by Chiyoumaru Shikura. In July 2019, Mages was acquired by Shikura's concept studio Chiyoumaru Studio, with the goal of being more flexible and fast in its decisions as a company independent from Dwango and the Kadokawa group. In March 2020, Colopl acquired Mages from Chiyoumaru Studio for ¥1.612 billion (approximately US\$14.92 million). In December 2022, it was reported that Mages would enter insolvency due to financial losses of ¥613 million (approximately \$4.6 million). In January 2023, Chiyoumaru Shikura announced via Twitter that he would resign as company chairman and executive director but stated that he would still be part of Mages as an Executive Producer. =====The 5pb. Over time, key developers from KID, Tonkin House, and Scitron joined 5pb. Games. ===== Chiyoumaru Studio is a multimedia concept studio founded by Chiyoumaru Shikura, leading the company which was originally named Chrome Edge in July 2019 after acquiring Mages shares, acquired all shares held by its former parent company Dwango the following year. The studio collaborates with Mages to develop video games and Kadokawa Corporation to print books and produce anime and manga.mages inc went through several changes after its establishment in 2008 as a subsidiary of Dwango.
