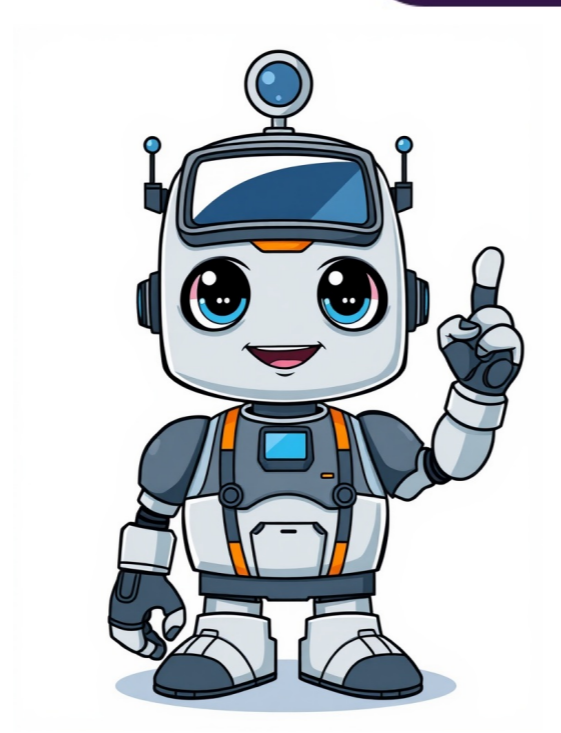

In other parts of the world, Emperor Xuan of Chen died after a 13-year reign, and he was succeeded by his son Chen Shubao. This marked the beginning of a new era in China, as the Sui dynasty took hold. Other notable events included the election of John Nestetes as the 33rd bishop or patriarch of Constantinople, and the death of Li Mi, a Chinese rebel leader during the Sui dynasty. The year also saw the rise of Agathias, a Greek poet and historian, who would go on to write extensively about the Byzantine Empire. Clovis would go on to conquer much of Western Europe and unite Northern Gaul under his rule.
