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Hillview School For Girls has a long history in Tonbridge, Kent, with its roots dating back to 1854. Initially known as 'Tonbridge Secondary School', the institution was established to cater to the growing population of working-class citizens in the area. The school's enrollment grew steadily over the years, with 54 students in 1854 increasing to 122 girls by 1868. A significant relocation occurred in 1871 when the school moved to a larger site on St. Stephens Street and Pembury Road. This move enabled the school to accommodate more students, with 258 girls enrolled by 1891. However, as the population continued to grow, further relocations became necessary. In 1929, the girls moved to the Technical Institute in Avebury Avenue, where they were housed in four different buildings. In 1936, the school relocated once again to a purpose-built facility, which would become known as 'Hectorage Road School'. With 315 students on roll, this new building provided more space for the growing student body. The school's name was officially changed to 'Hillview School for Girls' in 1968, following a democratic process initiated by the then-Head Mistress. The school continued to expand and improve over the years. A Maths and Technology block was added in 1996, while the status of Performing Arts College was achieved in 2001. This led to the construction of a Studio Theatre, which has since become a central hub for artistic expression within the school community. Recent developments include the introduction of new communities, with Franklin being the most recent addition in January 2020. The school's library boasts an impressive collection of toys, thanks to a donation from Ronald McDonald's private collection. These unique items have attracted visitors from afar and serve as a testament to the school's commitment to creativity and self-expression. Hillview School For Girls has received numerous accolades, including being judged 'Good' by Ofsted in 2018. The school's magazine, 'In view', features articles written by both staff and students, showcasing the wide range of extracurricular activities and events that take place within the school community. Hillview School for Girls stands as the top-performing non-selective girls' institution in Kent, offering secondary education to students aged 11-18. This secular school accommodates 1,340 pupils but currently hosts 1,532 students, with 15% eligible for free school meals. Mrs. Hilary Burkett leads as headteacher. The school fosters a calm, well-ordered atmosphere, though attendance for disadvantaged pupils requires improvement. English progress exceeds average, while science performance needs enhancement. Effective leadership and supportive staff drive qualifications and training, with regular professional development focused on refining teaching methods. Strengths include high-quality English instruction, though science remains a challenge. Parental engagement is strong, supported by an efficient governing body. Core values are well-communicated, earning parental satisfaction. Conflicts are addressed swiftly, with robust safeguarding measures ensuring pupil safety. Quality improvements target underperforming areas, particularly science and support for disadvantaged students. Bullying management reflects a positive safeguarding culture, with comprehensive staff training promoting welfare. Extracurricular activities highlight performing arts and diverse display projects. A supportive environment balances academics with extracurriculars, fostering a positive learning atmosphere. SEND interventions are refined for better progress. Performing arts show strong outcomes, while science requires attention. The school's legal age range and capacity are defined by DfE data, ensuring consistency in reporting. Free school meal eligibility, based on qualifying benefits, is reported annually. Data reflects 2021 census figures for super output areas. Education phase is secondary, with an Ofsted rating of 'Good' from September 2023. State-funded, non-selective admissions include a sixth form. Located at Brionne Gardens, TN9 2HE, the school's website is www.hillview.kent.sch.uk. With 1,544 pupils (94% capacity), 6.5% speak a first language other than English, 14.1% qualify for free meals, and 14.3% have special educational needs. Ethnic diversity data and absence rates are reported alongside local and national averages. Our school offers a non-selective approach to admissions, with a total of 233 available places.
